



Large 4to. (35 x 26.5 cm), title-page in French and English, pp. iii, iii, 73 hand-coloured aquatint plates with tissue paper guards and bilingual text. Generally, very clean and crisp. Occasional light damp staining and browning. Later calf gilt with rhombus-grid pattern applied on covers, richly decorated contemporary spine gilt in six compartments and double raised bands. Some signs of skilful restoration. Bookplates of Baronet Sir William Jerningham, to front pastedown, and Charles Tennant, to front free endpaper. A fine copy.

One of a series of costume books published by Miller, another (for a copy of which, see above) covered the Austrian Empire, a third the Ottomans, and a fourth China. The work copies a series of plates made between 1776 and 1779 in St. Petersburg by C. W. Müller and dedicated to Catherine the Great.

Depicted here are, amongst others, traditional costumes of the Finns, Laplanders, Estonians, Samoyeds, Mongols, Kirghis and Tartars.





The author of the engravings is Thomas Allom (1804 –1872), an English architect, artist, and topographical illustrator. A founding member of what became the Royal Institute of British Architects (RIBA), Allom designed many buildings in London, including the Church of St Peter's and parts of the elegant Ladbroke Estate in Notting Hill. However, he is mostly known today for his numerous topographical works, which were used to illustrate books on travel, such as this one. From the 1820s onwards, Allom travelled extensively through the UK and mainland Europe.





William Beattie MD (1793? -1875) was a Scottish physician and poet. In 1836 he travelled in Switzerland and in the land of the Waldenses. Subsequently he published a series of descriptive and historical works, which were illustrated W. H. Bartlett, on Switzerland, Scotland, The Waldenses, Castles and Abbeys of England, and The Danube. The plates in this book were engraved after the drawings by the artists William Bartlett (1809-1854) and Thomas Allom (1804-1862).



Scarce enlarged edition of William Beattie's illustrated book detailing various Scottish landscapes of the early 19th century. The plates were engraved by Robert Wallis after the artists Bartlett, Allom, Campion, and Mossman. William Beattie MD (1793 ? -1875) was a Scottish physician and poet. In 1836 he travelled in Switzerland and in the land of the Waldenses. Subsequently he published a series of descriptive and historical works, which were illustrated W. H. Bartlett, on Switzerland, Scotland, The Waldenses, Castles and Abbeys of England, and The Danube.







This book, written in heroic verse, contains a fascinating snapshot of the business life of the newly industrialised Birmingham in 1800. The engraved plates are consisting of visual advertisements for subscribing local businesses, a poetic praise of Birmingham by Bisset and an index. The author, James Bisset (ca. 1762 – 1832) was a Scottish-born artist, manufacturer, writer, collector, art dealer and poet, who spent most of his life in and around Birmingham. In 1808 Bissett established Birmingham's first museum and picture gallery, which was visited by famous figures of the time, such as the collector Sir William Hamilton and Horatio Nelson.



Browning and soiling to frontispiece and t-p, and generally throughout the book, especially in proximity of the insertions; some damp staining to the plates. T-p's upper corner torn apart and repaired with new paper. E1 repaired and reinforced to margin on verso; T2 with extensive repaired tear to upper margin towards centre, no text loss. In contemporary mottled calf, rebacked, title to gilt spine in six compartments with anchor emblem, corners and a few abrasions repaired. A complete, good copy in a fine binding.

First edition of this work detailing one of the most remarkable incidents in the whole of British maritime history. Following a request by West Indian merchants to George III, Sir Joseph Banks recommended that the Admiralty fit out the Bounty for a voyage from Tahiti to the West Indies in order to collect breadfruit trees. Banks also recommended Lieutenant Bligh as commander of the voyage on which Fletcher Christian sailed as the Master's Mate. Reaching Cape Horn in 1787 and encountering fierce headwinds, Bligh retreated across the South Atlantic to round the Cape of Good Hope and sail south to Australia and New Zealand to Tahiti. This is the first official account of the voyage and mutiny, edited from Bligh's journals by James Burney under the supervision of Sir Joseph Banks while Bligh was on his second breadfruit voyage. The year of publication also marked the court-martial proceedings against fourteen returned mutineers, three of whom were hanged.

First edition of a very rare botanical book from the library of Robert de Belder, creator of one of the greatest collections of botanical books in the world and founder of the Arboretum Kalmthout in Belgium. Lydia Byam was the elder sister of the Governor of Antigua, William Gunthorpe. This work was printed again in 1798 and 1799. The scarcity of complete copies in this good condition of this work could be seen in that – of the two copies in the Natural History Museum – one lacks 7 out of 12 plates; while the other has trimmed margins and a broken binding (our copy is well-margined). There are no other known institutional holdings in Britain, and we know of only one copy of the second edition (at the Wellcome Library). OCLC WorldCat lists three locations only of the present printing in the US (National Tropical Botanical Garden, Hamilton College Library, New York Public Library). No further copies RLG. Hunt 749: "One of the rarest of American floras; not listed by Pritzel, Jackson, Dunthorne, Nissen or Great Flower Books…The charming delicately engraved plates are an example of good representations of American flora which in some instances antedate the earliest colour plates of these subjects listed by Pritzel and Stapf".














8vo. 2 vols. 1st: (viii), 264 pp.; 2nd: (viii), 265 pp. The two volumes include 360 engravings taken from the author's painting of the Natives, their habitats and artefacts; the first volume contains a folded map of the U.S. in 1857, with the recent acquisition of California in evidence. Bound in original red cloth, gilt to spine. Cover and spines ornated with gilt reproduction of two of the lithographs. Tears at pp. 5 and 105 of volume 2. Inner joint cracked, showing some netting. Overall, a clean copy with only minor foxing and thumb marks here and there, and in good conditions.

George Catlin (1796 – 1872) was an American painter and ethnologist, who spent eight years travelling as a diplomat across the territories of the West recording the life and uses of the Natives. He had been fascinated by the native tribes of the West since from his youth and decided to collect as much information as possible regarding their habits before they failed into oblivion. Catlin was very aware of the systematic repression of Natives by the Government and sadly records the 'extinction' of the tribe of the Mandans in an appendix to this ninth edition. During his travels in the Territories, Catlin painted over 300 portraits of chiefs, settlements and artefacts. He further collected and recorded legends and rituals, which he describes in great details in his letters. The result of this astonishing amount of documents regarding the life of the Natives was summed up in the present publication. Catlin toured the U.S. and Europe with his collection of paintings and artefacts, holding conferences and raising awareness of the disappearance of Native culture.








The book contains a detailed and thorough history of Greenland including information on its natural history and its mores and customs. Amongst other topics, it describes whaling, sealing, fishing, health and medicine. This is one of the most important works on the history of the missionary experience of the Moravian Brethren in Greenland. This 2-volume set contains the first edition in English of this work that was originally published in Dutch in 1765 and is here translated by Gambold.



Long ms. owner's annotation on verso of t-p by the cleric Abraham Franck (1685-1733) – Trinity College Fellow, deacon of Ely and rector of West Dene in Wilthsire – praising William Cheyne (1657-1728), 2nd Viscount Newhaven, who donated the book to him, dated 4th August 1710, Chesham. Rebacked, bound in early gilt-ruled leather, title to spine. A very fine wide-margined copy.

Editio Princeps of most of Diodorus' texts: books 1-5 (represented as 1-6 in early eds., as 1 was divided into two parts) and 11-15 (books 16-20 only having been published by Oporinus in 1539). Contains many traditional travel books, including Ctesias' and (in book 5) an account of the lost Historia Sacra of Euhemerus (c. 300 BC), with its "mythographic" and elaborately detailed descriptions of imaginary islands in the lower Red Sea. Latin preface devoted to the 'typographus' Ulrich III Fugger, who edited the text. Fugger was a patron for the printing of many Classical editions. The present work includes parts of his universal history. Known in Latin as Bibliotheca Historica, it ranged from the age of mythology to 60 BC.

This beautiful edition is a collection of Ancient Greek and Latin texts on geography and cosmography. It includes the famous ethno-geographical description of the world written by the historian Dionysius Periegetes, which was first published by Robert Estienne in 1547, who was the father of Henry, the printer of this edition. This collection includes Pomponius Mela's De situ orbis, the cosmography of Aethicus Ister, and Gaius Julius Solinus's Polyistor, which is a description of the curiosities of the world compiled in Late Antiquity. Except for the geographical parts of Pliny's Historia naturalis, in which Mela is cited as an important authority, the De situ orbis is the only formal treatise on the subject in Classical Latin. This appears here with a commentary by the Spanish humanist Pedro Juan Oliver. The Polyistor is provided with a commentary by the hand of the Jesuit Martin Delrio. The Cosmography, which was issued under the name of Aethicus, its protagonist, is probably the work of a C8th writer, known as Pseudo-Jerome, who was close to the court historiographers of the early Carolingian period. Dionysius Periegetes came from Alexandria and is believed to have written his description at the time of the Roman Emperor Adrian.






This small souvenir book includes some beautifully coloured aquatints portraying the costumes of the main cities of Switzerland and the surrounding regions during the 19th century. This is a very rare publication as it contains all the plates in their original binding. The costumes are here represented within rural scenes also showing the typical activities of the area to which they pertain. The aquatints were most probably designed by one of the publishers, Rudolph Heinrich Fussli who studied with the famous Swiss landscape painter Johann Ludwig (or Louis) Bleuler. This is the autographed copy of the famous British painter John Keith-Vaughan (1912 – 1977), whose signature is found on the upper free endpaper. A pre-eminent Neo-Romantic in his early career, Keith-Vaughan later developed a personal style that led him to be one of the most successful painters of his generation. This book contains the account of the famous expedition of Thor Heyerdahl (1914 – 2002), a Norwegian explorer who wanted to prove the South-American origin of Polynesian people by building a raft and then sailing from Peru to Tahiti. 

This Natural History in three parts belongs to the second edition of the description of Egypt, which was printed by Charles-Louis-Fleury Panckoucke in 24 in-8vo volumes, divided in 26 books, plus 10 volumes (no. 27-37) including beautiful plates illustrating the Egyptian Antiquités, in 4 tomes, État Moderne, in 2 vols, the Histoire Naturelle, in 3 vols, and the Atlas Géographique, in 1 vol.. The first edition was printed between 1809 and 1822 at the Imprimerie Royale and it was the first scientific description of Ancient and Modern Egypt. This monumental enterprise represented a milestone in the history of French governmental printing. It was coordinated by the Institut d'Égypte, established by Bonparte at Cairo and chaired by Gaspard Monge. Fourier, who wrote the introduction, in 1798 was instructed to gather the reports concerning the multiple disciplines involved. The work was the result of the collaboration of many scientists, artists and technicians who voluntarily followed Bonaparte in this incredible adventure. After the capitulation of the army under General Menou, the scientists, artists and scholars returned to France. For fear of seeing scientists publish their work individually, the government quickly created an eight-member Egyptian Commission to carry out this "great work". The publication began in 1810; Napoleon wanted it to begin in 1809 to celebrate his first decade in power, and hence the title pages of the first volumes were backdated. The work was completed only in 1830, when the maps of Sinai, Egypt, and Palestine were finally taken out of the Dépôt de la Guerre, which, for security reasons, had so far kept under seal. Famous naturalists and illustrators contributed, such as Jacques Barraband, Pierre-Joseph Redouté, Geoffroy Saint-Hilaire and Jules-César Savigny. The quantity and accuracy of the information provided surpassed any work published before the expedition. The monuments were measured and described with remarkable precision. Even inscriptions whose mystery had not yet been understood were reproduced with great fidelity.

This is the second French edition of König's small survey on his country's costumes and people. Including 40 brightly coloured plates, this catalogue of costumes became very popular in Switzerland and among tourists. Well in the tradition of this kind of publications, the visual description of costumes is followed by a short text giving more details on the dresses themselves and on the activities these were used for. The idea that the form of the dress will have to serve a precise function is well eradicated in modern fashion literature. All characters are peasants and that their simple life-style is profusely exalted by the anonymous writer, possibly König himself. Franz Niklaus König (1765 – 1832) was a painter and printer from Bern. After his apprenticeship with Anton Dunker, he opened his own workshop in 1786 and started producing landscapes and rural scenes. However, his popularity was due to his illustrations of costumes that he published in great quantity. He was also known for his 'diaphanies', scenes painted on glass, which he projected through the lights of candles.



The author of this work, Edward Lear (1812 – 1888) was an English artist, illustrator, musician, author and poet, now known mostly for his literary nonsense poetry and prose and especially his limericks. As an artist he is most known for his illustrations of birds and animals, coloured drawings during his many journeys in Italy and the Mediterranean, which he reworked later, sometimes as plates for his travel books and as a (minor) illustrator of Alfred, Lord Tennyson's poems.







The first illustrated edition of this important guide to Rome, dedicated to Francis I. The text, first published in 1534 by Antonio Blado with a dedication by Rabelais, was substantially amended and enriched with woodcut plans, views, and sculptures for the present edition. Born to a noble Milanese family, Bartolomeo Marliani dedicated his life to the study of Roman archaeology. This work was the pre-eminent account of the antiquities of classical Rome of his day, many of which were to suffer subsequent alteration or disappearance. This edition is one of the masterpieces of Renaissance classical architecture and has remained justly sought after throughout four and a half centuries. The enduring importance of the work is that it tells us what the city was like before many of its ancient ruins were altered, incorporated or swept away in the great building activities of the late 16th and early 17th centuries.

Marliani's approach to the archeology of Rome differs considerably from that of his predecessors, especially Giacomo Mazzocchi, in that he gives far more prominence to architectural and sculptural detail than to inscriptions, which had almost solely occupied earlier archaeologists. Illustrations include a map of Rome, the mythological founders of the city Romulus, and his brother Remus with the she-Wolf, the Laocoon, the Circus Maximus, the Celsus' Pyramid, the Pantheon, and the Obelisk. The depiction of the statue of Laocoon is one of the earliest ever produced. In fact, Marliani was present in Rome to the unveiling of the statue in 1520.

Julia Pardoe (1804 – 1862), was an English poet, novelist, historian and traveller. She was amongst one the first women to describe Turkey, where she travelled with her father, Commander Thomas Pardoe, in 1836. Her most popular work is The City of the Sultan and Domestic Manners of the Turks (1837), which presented the Turkish upper class with sympathy and humanity. She is also known today for her historical books on the French 16th and 17th-century courts. These included Louis the Fourteenth and the Court of France in the Seventeenth Century (1847), The Court and Reign of Francis the First, King of France (1849), and The Life of Marie de Medicis, Queen and Regent of France (1852).

This comprehensive work about Constantinople, its people and customs was a very popular publication also due to the beautiful illustrations after William Henry Bartlett. The plates depict wonderful landscapes and views of the city, including the mausoleum and the mosque of Suleiman the Magnificent.

This 2-volume work is the latest and enlarged edition of the first "guide" to Holland that was originally published in 1660. An emerging literary genre, the travelogue, quickly boasted a large audience in France and this work of Jean-Nicolas de Parival (1605-1669), Les Délices de la Hollande, was one of the literary successes of the second half of the 17th century which was then reissued many times in the 18th century. It can be described as a tourist guide avant-lalettre, being halfway between a compilation and an original work. In it we find the etymology of the name of the country, geographical information, some remarks on customs, taxes, religion, nobility, government, the navy and the description of the cities of the Southern and Northern Netherlands, starting with Leiden, the author's residence.







Autograph of 17thcentury owner, the nobleman Lucrezio Palladio degli Olivi, from Friuli (once Republic of Venice), dated "1670" on top of second leaf's verso. Handwritten foliation; ms. indexing on last leaf, probably by the same early hand that wrote most annotations; loose sheet with 18th-century ms. list of the following popes, from Paul II up to Pius VI, consecrated in 1775. In vellum over thick boards. Ink date to spine plus reference numeration. A lovely copy in good condition.

This incunable is the third edition of Platina's The Lives of the Popes (first printed in 1479). This work is the first systematic handbook of Papal history. Composed by the Italian humanist, theologian, and historian Bartolomeo Platina and presented to Sixtus IV in manuscript form at the end of 1474, the original copy is still held at the Vatican Library.

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
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



All aspects of the Royal residences are described in this work, from the kitchen and general running of the household to individual items of furniture. The work culminates with an alphabetical list of portraits in the Royal Collections described in the book and a list of plates. Pyne provided the text and the drawings were supplied by eminent artists such as Nash, Pugin, MacKenzie amongst others. Though the work had some success, it involved Pyne in serious financial difficulties, and he was on more than one occasion confined for debt in the King's Bench prison.

Robert Tennant (1828-1900) was invited to be part of a commission that had the task of studying the economic situation of Sardinia in order to identify its actual, potential resources, He went "to all areas of the region, coming into direct contact with the provincial and municipal authorities, with the most important landowners, with traders" and had the opportunity to consult the public registers in all the municipalities. At the end of the investigation, Tennant, finding himself in possession of a large amount of data, decided to compose a book that was an opportunity to exploit the vast amount of material concerning history, life, traditions of the Sardinians that he collected during his travels.



125 years ago, in 1891, works for the Trans-Siberian Railway began. Today, this legendary train line is still considered one of the greatest infrastructure projects in the history of mankind. A railway across Eurasia not only made the East closer but also contributed to the foundation of many cities, without which it is impossible to imagine Russia. It only took about 25 years to complete the railway.

Created in Krasnoyarsk by I. R. Tomashkevich and M. B. Axelrode, this photo album was meant to proudly advertise and promote this difficult engineering enterprise. This reportage fostered the new policies of the ruling class aiming to unify Russia culturally, as pointed out by the scholar Mikhaylova Natalia in "Confectionery trade cards from the series 'The views of Siberia and the Siberian railway' as part of mass visual culture of the late 19 early 20 century Russia" in ART&CULT, No. 18, 2-2015: "This method of memorialization of a large statesponsored construction project had foreign analogues: in the late 1860s an album "Great West Illustrated" devoted to the construction of the Pacific railroad was published in the United States. However, the significance of the Tomashkevich-Axelrode album for its time was far more profound than just publishing the documents on Trans-Siberian Railway. It played an important role in promoting this ambitious construction project, both in Russia and abroad. The album was presented at the Exposition Universelle of 1900 in Paris and, along with the famous panoramas of P. Piasecky, was meant to shape a visual image of a new large-scale Russian undertaking in European audience. [...] A world's fair in Paris was widely covered in the press of the period, and the Russian public was well informed about the exhibits presented in the Russian pavilion that were dedicated to the construction of the Trans-Siberian Railway. It is likely that the album by Tomashkevich-Axelrode had a high cultural status".







Christopher Wordsworth (30 October 1807 – 20 March 1885) was an English bishop in the Anglican Church and man of letters. He was the youngest son of Christopher Wordsworth, Master of Trinity College (Cambridge), who was the youngest brother of the poet William Wordsworth. After a brilliant school and academic career, he became senior classic, and was elected a fellow and tutor of Trinity in 1830 and shortly afterwards he took holy orders. In 1832–1833 he travelled in Greece, and published various works on its topography and archaeology, the most famous of which is the one entitled Greece: pictorial, descriptive, and historical (1839), here in the French translation.

Magnificent work on the villas and country houses of Tuscany. The work was first published in 1744 and Bouchard's first edition in 1754 with this edition appearing three years later. The engravings are by a range of different artists: Benedetti, Berardi, Carboni, Corsi, Duflos, Filosi, Franceschini, Giampiccoli, Marieschi, Mogalli, Monaco, Morghen, Muller, Parr, Piranesi, Seuter and Wagner, all after Zocchi.

Giuseppe Zocchi (c. 1711–1767) was an Italian painter and printmaker active in Florence and best known for his vedute of the city.

The villas depicted include Villa di Poggio Imperiale, Villa di Monte Gufoni, Villa La Cecina and the Careggi Villa. Some of thre plates also show the gardens and surrounding Tuscan countryside, including views of the Arno for example.
