On this important occasion, we are delighted to showcase a carefully chosen selection from our stock, including exquisite illuminated manuscripts and cuttings, rare incunables, presentation copies, autographs and selected artworks.

Our selection of manuscripts and incunables includes a late 11th century Romanesque leaf fragment from the *Liber Passionalis* (n. 1); a very attractive 15th century manuscript, in superb condition, of Petrarch's *Canzoniere* (n. 3); a wonderful and very well-preserved leaf from a 1455 Gutenberg Bible (n. 4); and a perfect copy of the third Parma edition of Pliny's Natural History (n. 8).

We are also proud to present a carefully chosen assortment of books from the 16th to the 19th century which include a richly illustrated copy of Andrea Alciati's *Emblematum libellus* (n. 19); a rare first edition of the Portuguese translation of Virgil's *Georgics* and *Bucolics* by Leonel da Costa (n. 24); and the first book ever printed with embossed types for the blind, using a technology that predates that of the Braille alphabet (n. 43).

Amongst the presentation copies, we are pleased to showcase Aleister Crowley's *Moonchild* with the author's dedication (n. 51) and Andy Warhol's *From A to B and Back Again* with signature and a drawing by the author on the half-title page (n. 57).

Art objects include two outstanding handcoloured aquatints from the original Double Elephant Folio Edition of John James Audubon's *Birds of America* and a painted portrait of Charles Dickens, after a photograph by John Watkins.

1. [MAXIMUS of Turin et

al.] *Romanesque leaf fragment from the Liber Passionalis.* Switzerland or Austria, late 11th century. Substantial cutting from a very large Romanesque manuscript, 21,5 x 21,5 cm. Framed and glazed (46 x 36 cm). This is an appealing early leaf of a date which is hard to now find on the market.

The parent book of this striking fragment would have been central to life of the monastery or the community it belonged to in the Early Middle Ages – containing the lives of saints most sacred to the the community. This part contains that of St. Leonard of Noblac, a Frankish noble (perhaps a royal) during the reign of the Merovingian king Clovis I (the founder of the Merovingian dynasty, and the "clodouei regis" three lines below the initial here).

[ANON.] Decorated Initial 'P' on a cutting from an illuminated choir book on parchment. Italy (Bologna or Siena?), c. 1278.
25 x 10 cm (framed and glazed 43 x 28 cm). Long, tall and thin decorated initial "P" enclosing an exquisite penwork human face - perhaps an oblate of a monastic

community or a choirboy- on a cutting from a decorated choir book on vellum.

A fine and remarkably early example of Italian medieval illumination. The decorative elements, such as the style of the white penwork and red colour palette, suggest that the artist was the Master of Bagnacavallo (active late thirteenth century). He is otherwise known from a series of cuttings taken from the choir books of Imola Cathedral (New York, Metropolitan Museum, 26.159.1 & 26.159.2, and probably also that sold from F.G. Zeileis collection by Koller, Zurich, 18 September 2015, lot 101), and this may be a missing cutting from that group.

One leaf missing, hence Rvf 1 to 4 are missing with the exception of v. 14 of Rvf 4. Late 19th century limp vellum. An important ms, in exceptional condition, which will add to further scholarly study on Petrarch's oeuvre.

A near complete and exceptional manuscript of Petrarch's Canzoniere or Rerum vulgarium fragmenta. This decorated manuscript in one hand is also supplemented by the additional ballata "Donna mi viene spesso ne la mente", belonging to Petrarch's disperse or uncollected poems (cf. Solerti, Rime disperse, no. 1). £ 120,000

4. GUTENBERG BIBLE. A leaf from the Book of Jeremiah. Mainz, 1455. Royal folio (390 x 285 mm). Single leaf, on thick paper; 42-lines. Two initials, book headers and chapter numbers rubricated in red and blue. Capitals highlighted with red. Extremely rare rubricator's guidelines in black-brown ink to upper blank margins in a neat German hand. Contained in a dark blue morocco case.

A remarkably clean, well-margined and rubricated leaf from the 1455 Biblia Latina – the first book to be printed with movable types in Europe and the symbol of the printing revolution. The present leaf features a section from the Old Testament of St Jerome's Vulgate: Jeremiah 25:19 to 27:6. The leaf is identifiable as vol. II, quire 9 (leaf 3), fol. 83. The Bull's Head (type I or II) watermark suggests this was a first setting. £95,000

and animals. Bound in modern vellum with metal fittings and corner pieces imitating a medieval binding.

A splendid prayer book for private use, including prayers to St. Catherine of Siena, the Three Kings, the Trinity, the Virgin and St. Francis. Further prayers ascribed to important saints; collects for the hours and the offers of indulgences. £ 22,000

Folio (31.1 x 20.5 cm). 3 works in 1 volume. Very wide margins. Rubricated throughout with attractive diagrams and maniculae in red ink. Bound in contemporary blind-stamped calf over thick wooden boards.

This volume brings together three rare editions of Franciscan texts of the 15th century dealing with Christian *morality.*

Royal folio (40.5 x 27.5 cm). 269 leaves. Gothic type, doublecolumn text of 50 lines. A rare woodcut border on first leaf of text. 10-line printed initials at the beginning of each sermon. Smaller 3-line initials in the last section. Bound in contemporary Landshut blind-stamped pigskin over thick wooden boards.

The splendid decoration of this book also appeared in other books by Johann Zainer and was praised by William Morris as one of the finest examples of woodcut decoration of the fifteenth century. This book displays an exceptional degree of preservation, which facilitates the observation of these decorations in their original, untouched state.

A perfect copy of the third Parma edition of Pliny's Natural History. In his work on natural science, Pliny discusses geography, ethnography, anthropology, human physiology, zoology, botany, mineralogy, sculpture and painting.

A ms. note on pastedown, in Italian, commemorating the return of Capitan Elcano on the Victoria, the first ship ever to circumnavigate the globe. In 18thcentury vellum over thick boards. *The first systematic handbook on Papal history, with a moving ms. reference to the success of Magellan's expedition around the world.*

Title-page with large woodcut and 52 smaller woodcuts, incorporated in the text. Bound in blind-stamped calf over wooden boards, with brass clasps in imitation of a fifteenth-century binding.

These charming woodcuts are featured in his guide to the daily readings of Epistles and the Gospels. The Kraus copy.

Lacking initial blank and h6. 19th century blindstamped calf; rebacked with erroneous place (Venice) and date (c. 1490); gilt lettering on spine. Rare.

This work is considered to be one of the books which had the greatest impact on historiography during the period between antiquity and the Middle Ages. It attempted to counter the argument that the world had declined since the advent of Christianity. This is the fourth edition of Orosius' universal history and it was printed at the first press in Vicenza in c. 1482.

This is the first illustrated edition and the first one edited by Johann Urlich Surgant (c. 1450 – 1503) from a manuscript he had recently discovered in the Basel Cathedral Library.

An anonymous compilation of sermons which in the past was erroneously attributed to Erhard Prunner (cf. H. Knaus: Amicus. In: Beiträge zur Inkunabelkunde 3. Folge 3. Berlin 1967, pp. 184-186).

First and only Aldine edition of this work about Roman coinage by Guillaume Budé. The Aldine edition was revised and amended by the author and commissioned by the famous bibliophile Jean Grolier (1479 - 1565).

The Emblemata is made up of a series of allegories and symbols represented

in the woodcuts which are explained by short texts in Latin verse that introduce a moral teaching. The 111 woodcuts in this 1540 edition are attributed to the engraver Jean Jollat and they were previously used in Wechel's 1534 French edition of Alciati's emblem book. The emblems address a variety of subjects, including the Virtues (Cardinal and Theological), the Vices (such as Lechery, Pride and Gluttony), Life, Death, Love, Honour, Nature, Peace and many more.

EDITIO PRINCEPS of this important collection of orations by the Greek philosopher Dio Chrysostom (155-235 BC). The present work was edited by Federico Torresano, one of Andrea's sons.

The controversy between Emser and Luther came to a head in 1519, with unprecedented acrimony. The two theologians clashed with one another for many years both in public as well as in print. In order to counter the fast-spreading success of Luther's Bible, the Catholic Duke of Saxony, George 'The Bearded', encouraged Emser to undertake his translation of the New Testament. First illustrated edition. The manuscript text to the sides is an anonymous adaptation of Ovid's 'Metamorphoses', which was first attributed to pseudo-Donatus and then to the pseudo-Lactantius.

AUTHOR'S PRESENTATION COPY of Neander's 'Tabacologia' to A. Falkenburg. Neander recommended the medical use of tobacco in recipes and warned against its recreational abuse. It was, he said, "a plant of God's own making, but the devil likewise involved; excesses ruined both mind and body".

This edition shows the Greek types designed by John Baskerville (1706 -1775). This copy was once owned by Newcome. Rev. William who attempted a better English translation of the Gospels. This is Newcome's working copy of the Greek New Testament, which he copiously annotated with notes regarding important words within the text.
